A new Shared Learning Project for Kirkby U3A

Kirkby U3A, which is quite small and very new, is undertaking a Shared Learning Project with their local Library. Kirkby lies just south of the Lancashire boundary, within the Merseyside area: the original settlement, mentioned in the Doomsday Book, became completely inundated with the housing and industrial development as huge areas of Liverpool were cleared and the residents moved out to pastures new. The scope of their project is to seek out older residents who remember Kirkby when it was a small farming village and before it became a New Town in the early 1950s. The team is led by Anne Levey of Kirkby U3A, and they are collecting written or photographic material to help in their search for people who can call on old memories of Kirkby in their childhood days and how it has changed. One member of the team has lived there all her life. Can any neighbouring U3A members recall the "old" Kirkby or do you know any former residents who have moved away to nearby areas? Do let me know and I'll pass on the information.

<u>Trustee Topics – a new feature for</u> our North West Newsletter

1. Trusteeship

Some of you are not aware of the fact that if you are an <u>elected or co-opted</u> committee member then you are by default a Trustee. You cannot opt out of being a Trustee. Trustees are responsible for the proper handling of all your U3A monies including group money and social events money.

Members of U3A committees are covered as an individual trustee or as a board against genuine mistake or error provided that they have acted responsibly. All committees are covered by 'Charity Trustees Management Liability Insurance' provided by the Third Age Trust. A copy of this insurance should be held by the business secretary of your U3A. If you have not followed proper practice or chosen to ignore irregularities within your U3A you may not be covered by the insurance. I would also like to remind you that all new committee members need to sign the declaration form CSD-1382, which should be retained by the chairman or business secretary and be given the 'Code of Conduct for U3A Trustees' as part of their induction. Reference to the Charity Commission website???

2. Groups

When a new U3A is started, Groups are initiated and all members are new. The information booklet 'Interest Groups' gives guidance as to how to start a group, setting goals, deciding the range and nature of your subject, how you are going to learn, where you will meet, how you will communicate and the logistics if you are going to use transport. Older U3As may never have defined goals for their groups. Maybe they have been overlooked or they have developed bad practice. This can lead to friction and disputes within the group. Life's too short for this and in the U3A we learn for fun. There are many ways of dealing with disputes - refer to advice note No 6, 'Sorting out Problems/Grievances' if you are unsure. All groups, because of their nature, plan their activities in different ways. It's rare for a group to plan its progression as it ages. A topic to discuss with your group coordinators/leaders maybe? The paper 'Interest Groups' can be downloaded from the National website (Document downloads- Information booklets) and is an excellent starting point for such a discussion.

Grant Aid for U3As-where can you find help?

Many U3As have gained sums of money from the bodies that offer grant aid for specific items or projects. A good first contact point is your local Council for Voluntary Service or Community Council (there are both in Lancashire) so go ahead and do a Google search to see where your local office is based. Some Local Authorities (Parish, Borough and County) have grant schemes and some individual Councillors have a small allocation, which they can give to worthy causes. Some Lottery funds target older people's activities with a particular interest in providing IT training and equipment.

There are many other charities with specific interests, such as health, access to art or theatre, sport and technology. Applications are often detailed; grants may come with strings attached and always there will be a feed-back process, but it's worth making an effort. You could be rewarded with a new projector and screen, computers or sound systems. The words "older people" are often the key that opens the door to grant aid.

Do let us know what you have achieved and how you did it so we can pass on the advice to other U3As.

Applying for funding – a story from Hoylake U3A

After several occasions when we had to borrow a digital projector and computer for visiting speakers, we decided to try and purchase our own. We didn't have enough funding to do this so we applied to the 'Awards for All' scheme through the Big Lottery Fund._We visited their website 'biglotteryfund.org.uk' and followed the prompts to 'Awards for All'. This gave us very clear guidelines. If you are looking for funding it is well worth a visit.

The application form can be completed online. In addition applicants need to explain their reason for making the application. They will be asked to identify costs and to say what difference the project will make to their group. Once the application form has been received by 'Awards for All' the group will get a reply and will probably be asked to supply a range of documents. For us, these included a copy of the latest approved annual accounts, copies of three bank statements and a copy of our Constitution.

Eventually we received confirmation that our grant was approved and how much we could spend. We were then able to purchase the equipment we required provided it was within the costs awarded. We were given the Lottery logo to display.

The whole process was steady and efficient and the results well worth waiting for.
